

To Serve and to Save

For use: February 21 - 27

Texts: Isaiah 41; Isaiah 42:1-7; Isaiah 44:26-45:6; Isaiah 49:1-12

Jim "Mattress Mack" McIngvale is already a local folk hero in Houston, and he is adding to his legacy. During Hurricane Harvey in 2017, Jim sent his employees out to find people stranded by the flooding and bring them into his Gallery Furniture stores for shelter and safety. Now, during this year's historic winter storm in Texas, he opened his doors again to those without power and heat. Once there, the refugees found food, coffee, hot chocolate, blankets and sweatshirts in the comfort of brand-new furniture displays.

There are different levels of need, but the first question he asks is, "What can we do to help?" His philosophy is, "Rather than complain about what should have been done, let's just do things that are good for the community." He adds, "Whether they want to stay for two hours until their power gets back on, or they want to stay for two days, we're here for the community." [1]

Just as Mattress Mack demonstrates that true service brings practical, tangible help, God intended that the nation of Israel would use their blessings to serve the poor and disadvantaged. Even though they often failed in that calling, God did not abandon them. Isaiah reminded them of God's promise that, "You (Israel) are my servant; I have chosen you and have not rejected you." (Isaiah 41:9) Then God gives one of the most powerful promises in Scripture: "So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand."

God initially identified the fulfillment of that promise as an unnamed individual servant. This person, filled with God's Holy Spirit, will bring justice to all, open

the eyes of the blind, and release captives from the darkest dungeons. We see some of the other clues as to the identity of this person in Isaiah 42:1-7: He works quietly and gently, he is a teacher, and he opens up opportunities for the Gentiles to receive God's light. From our 21st century vantage point, we know that this servant is Jesus of Nazareth, the Savior of the world.

Jesus reached out to people by meeting practical, tangible needs first. He healed the sick, opened the eyes of the blind, and fed the hungry. Once He'd taken care of people's immediate, physical needs, then they were willing to hear Him address their spiritual needs. He then healed the emotionally and traumatically sick, opened the eyes of the spiritually blind, and fed those hungry for spiritual truth.

We have the privilege of partnering with God in this hands-on ministry. We don't need to travel to Palestine to walk in the steps of Jesus; rather, we walk in Jesus' steps when we minister to those in need—whether they are without heat and food in Texas, or needing a word of hope and encouragement in our own neighborhoods.

Valuing: Sometimes as individuals, we can feel helpless to make a real difference in the face of so many overwhelming challenges. What is one thing you'd really like to do to help others? Contact one other member of your group and share your thoughts with each other. Pray that God will direct you and empower you both to follow through with your brainstorming to make a

difference in your world.
