

## Covenant at Sinai

**For use:** May 9 - 15

**Texts:** Deuteronomy 1:29-31; Hosea 11:1; Revelation 5:9; Deuteronomy 29:10-13; Exodus 19:5, 6; Romans 6:1, 2; Revelation 14:12; Romans 10:3

Despite her birth in a Turkish prison, her father's bad rap with the Turkish government, having two dead husbands by the age of 40, the gender norms of the day, and finding herself in fierce opposition to the powerful Ottoman Empire, naval captain Laskarina Bouboulina would change the course of history. [1] Under her wise leadership and by carefully curating her fortune, she supplied Greek revolutionaries with the strategies, ammunition and sea vessels that helped defeat the Turkish-Egyptian fleet. [2]

She saw Greece gain independence before her death in 1825. Posthumously she was ranked Admiral of the Russian Navy, and as recently as 2018 was given the rank of Rear Admiral of the Hellenic Navy. [3] Many believe that if not for her valiant efforts, Greece would not have overthrown its oppressor.

Similarly, God's people have had their own share of throwing off the shackles of abusive foreign powers. For instance, the Old Testament texts we study this week remind us that God's children were captives in Egypt. Moses, despite the challenges he faced in his personal life, was directed by God in leading the Israelites out from under Pharaoh's thumb. A covenant was then made between the freed Israelites and God at Mount Sinai in which the Israelites were promised that, if they heeded the Lord, God would form them into their own nation: a kingdom of priests (Exodus 19:5-6).

Revelation and the writings of Paul expand on this message, revealing that

Christ's sacrifice extends the holy kingdom, including people of every ethnicity, language, and location on Earth. Revelation 14:12 calls on the endurance of those who receive this gift and have faith in Christ Jesus, no matter the persecution that God's nation will face. And Ephesians 6:10-20 reminds us that, like Bouboulina, we need to be prepared for (spiritual) warfare.

As we celebrate the 250th birthday of the Grecian heroine this week, [4] may we also be inspired to overthrow the oppression of sin and to maintain a new Christian identity by donning the armor of Christ.
